

THE LITURGICAL ENVIRONMENT

The liturgical colour during Easter Time is white for resurrection but today is red which symbolises the fire of the Holy Spirit. On this 50th day of Easter we give thanks for the gift of God's Spirit that enlivens all the people of God and works through all creation. The paschal candle stands in the sanctuary till this day. After today it will be moved to the Place of Baptism. It will be lit at baptisms and funerals throughout the year.

FROM FR STUART:

PRAY THE SPIRIT RENEWS THE EARTH

Today we reach the final day of Easter Time when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit – Pentecost Sunday.



It is the eighth Sunday in this Easter season which underscores the idea of us living in the eighth day – the day of the new creation. The Holy Spirit of Christ animates our lives and the life of the whole creation.


It is why many people wear red to church to illustrate the presence of the Holy Spirit of Christ in their life and the life of this faith community.

May God's Spirit renew each of our lives each day. Casting your eye around, not just on our own life circumstances, but the world around us we see the need for the Spirit of God is needed more and more.

In the letter to the Galatians, the apostle Paul lists the fruits of the Spirit as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-

control. (Gal 5:22-23)

Friday 17 May was IDAHOBIT Day – the United Nations' recognised International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia and Transphobia. Expressions of hatred continue towards these diverse communities. The meme here does not merely summarise a fine aspiration but also mirrors the gifts of the Spirit as listed by Saint Paul.



The gift of peace is also needed especially in Gaza where the population is being displaced once again and moves for a ceasefire are repeatedly rebuffed.

The gift of patience and generosity are also needed in the world as we tackle some of the biggest issues of inequality and climate change – more starkly revealed in the budget this week. A wealthy country could do more, surely? And the spirit of gentleness is needed in public discourse and politics.

Finally, I was delighted to commission our new director of music, Daniel Brace, last Sunday. Pray for him and for God's Spirit to infuse all we shall continue to do in singing God's praise. God bless you all.

GATHERING IN GOD'S NAME

We stand when the bell is rung.

The liturgy commences with the hymn whilst the priest and liturgical ministers enter.

The altar, which symbolises Christ, is reverenced and censed.

The Entrance Hymn is sung.

- 1 Come, Holy Spirit, come! Inflame our souls with love, transforming every heart and home with wisdom from above. O let us not despise the humble path Christ trod, but choose, to shame the worldly-wise, the foolishness of God.
- 2 Come with the gift to heal the wounds of guilt and fear, and to oppressions's face reveal the kingdom drawing near. Where chaos longs to reign, descend, O holy Dove, and free us all to work again the miracles of love.
- Spirit of truth, arise;
 inspire the prophet's voice:
 expose to scorn the tyrannt's lies,
 and bid the poor rejoice.
 O Spirit, clear our sight,
 all prejudice remove,
 and help us to discern the right,
 and covet only love.

- 4 Give us the tongues to speak, in every time and place, to rich and poor, to strong and weak, the word of love and grace. Enable us to hear the words that others bring, interpreting with open ear the special song they sing.
- Come, Holy Spirit, dance within our hearts today, our earthbound spirits to entrance, our mortal fears allay. And teach us to desire, all other things above, that self-consuming holy fire, the perfect gift of love!

THE COMMEMORATION OF BAPTISM

After the introduction to the rite, the community prays in silence after which the priest recites the prayer over the vessel of water.

We make it our own by replying,

Amen.

The Priest moves through the community sprinkling holy water whilst a song that is baptismal in character led by the cantor is sung.


We repeat the refrain after the cantor and again after each verse:



- We are fire and water,

 he is our story and he our song.


The rite concludes with the absolution.

THE OPENING PRAYER

The priest sings the opening prayer and we respond:



We sit for the readings.



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

The response at the end of the reading is:

Hear the word of the Lord, thanks be to God.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

The cantor sings the psalm, and the congregation repeats the response and then joins in the response throughout the psalm.

O Lord God, your glory is great.

We stand to welcome the gospel.

THE GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

We repeat the acclamation after the cantor and again after the sentence reflecting the theme of the gospel:

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.

A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to Saint John
 Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

After the end of the Gospel, the reader says:

The Gospel of the Lord, praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

We sit for the homily.

THE HOMILY

THE APOSTLES' CREED

We stand for the creed which is said by all.

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints. the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

We remain standing.
The response to the petitions are:

Lord, in your mercy: hear our prayer.

The response after the prayers for the departed is:

Rest eternal grant to them, O Lord.
 And let light perpetual shine upon them.

and concludes with this prayer:

Almighty God, you have promised to hear our prayers grant that what we have asked in faith we may by your grace receive, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

THE GREETING OF PEACE

The priest introduces the Greeting of Peace and then says:

The peace of the Lord be always with you. **And also with you.**



THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

THE PRESENTATION OF THE GIFTS AND THE CENSING

While the gifts of bread and wine are brought to the sanctuary and the altar is prepared we sing the hymn. The altar and the priest are censed.

The thurifer comes into the nave to cense the whole assembly

OFFERTORY HYMN

- All together in one place friends of Jesus met to pray, waiting as the Lord had said for the Pentecostal day. Alleluia!
- All together with one power poured out when the Spirit came, touching each and filling all, rushing wind and burning flame. Alleluia!
- All together with one voice, praising God in every tongue: languages they never learned, telling what the Lord had done. Alleluia!
- 4 All together with one aim: bearing witness to their Lord – sharing faith by word and deed, preaching Christ, the living Word. Alleluia!





We stand throughout the prayer.




The Prayer continues to the Sanctus and Benedictus is sung by all to the setting below.

After the elevation of the Host and the elevation of the Chalice, all may bow with the priest in adoration of real presence of Christ. and all join in singing the Acclamation:




THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE COMMUNION

Therefore, let us keep the festival.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

Fr Stuart administers communion to the servers and Eucharistic Assistants.

Feel free to sit until the following invitation to communion.

Come!

Draw near with faith and receive the gifts of God for the people of God!

Thanks be to God!

Christ is the host at the altar here at Saint Bartholomew's and welcomes all, especially those who are communicant members of other denominations.

If today, you prefer to receive a blessing—please indicate this to the Priest.

HYMN DURING COMMUNION

The choir sing the following hymn during the communion.

Written and composed by John Bell and Graham Maule, it beautifully captures feminine imagery for the Holy Spirit.

- She sits like a bird, brooding on the waters, hovering on the chaos of the world's first day; she sighs and she sings, mothering creation, waiting to give birth to all the Word will say.
- 2 She wings over earth, resting where she wishes, lighting close at hand or soaring through the skies; she nests in the womb, welcoming each wonder, nourishing potential hidden to our eyes.
- 3 She dances in fire, startling her spectators, waking tongues of ecstasy where dumbness reigned; she weans and inspires all whose hearts are open, nor can she be captured, silenced, or restrained.

THE BLESSING OF LIGHT

The priest and liturgical ministers go the Paschal Candle.

A thanksgiving for light begins with:

Blessed are you, sovereign God

and concluding with:

..... blessed are you, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Blessed be God for ever.

The congregation sit during the singing of the following hymn, as servers assist in the lighting of the candles which each member of the congregation holds.

- Come down, O Love divine, seek thou this soul of mine, and visit it with thine own ardour glowing; O Comforter, draw near, within my heart appear, and kindle it, thy holy flame bestowing.
- 2 O let if freely burn, till earthly passions turn to gold and silver in its heat refining; and let thy glorious light shine ever on my sight, and clothe me round, the while my path illumining.

- 3 Let holy charity mine outward vesture be, and lowliness become mine inner clothing: true lowliness of heart, which takes the humbler part and o'er its own shortcomings weeps with loathing.
- 4 And so the yearning strong, with which the soul will long, shall far outpass the power of human telling; for none can guess its grace, till they become the place wherein the Holy Spirit makes her dwelling.







OUR ICON TODAY:

Pentecost: The Descent of the Holy Spirit

The icon on the cover of today's Mass booklet was originally painted towards the end of the fifteenth century. It is known as 'The Descent of the Holy Spirit' (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982). As with all Christian icons the Pentecost icon aims to bring us into the reality of the event depicted. The following are reflections on the symbolism and meaning of this icon.

The position of the figures represents harmony in which no apostle is depicted as being better than another. The inverse perspective prevents the apostles who are near the back of the semicircle from being painted as smaller figures. Peter and Paul as the chief apostles are shown slightly larger. Yet even they are among equals. The four evangelists hold books symbolizing the writings of the four gospels, and the remainder hold scrolls which show that even those who did not write gospels still proclaimed the gospel message to the world.

The calm ambience in this icon stands in contrast to the Pentecost story itself. There is no discord or chaos. In Acts 2:1-11 we read about a sudden sound from heaven, a violent wind, tongues of fire, words spoken in different languages, and of bewilderment and amazement. There is nothing shown in this icon that resembles these features: no sounds, no words, no speaking disciple, no excited crowd.

What we do see is complete tranquility of harmony and order. Thus, it is the deeper meaning of Pentecost that the iconographer wanted to express. The top of the semicircle of apostles is empty because this is the seat of Jesus who is invisibly present. Jesus said before his ascension that he is with us until the end of time. And we know that Jesus continues to keep that promise being invisibly present yet guiding us through the Holy Spirit.

Each of the twelve apostles are seated in slightly separate ways.

All are depicted with an individual halo (nimbus) thus showing their holiness. Few are looking at each other or collaborating with each other. It is not their common psychological make-up that unites them. These men have not come together because of their compatibility.

The iconographer has given each apostle individuality with their hair, eyes, movement of their heads and gestures. What does bind them together in unity are the rays of the Spirit descending from above.

The king-like figure standing at the bottom of the icon is often known as 'Cosmos,' representing the peoples of the world. Nouwen (2007) tells us that he is sitting 'in darkness and the shadow of death' (Luke 1:79). Such ugliness violates the elegant Pentecost scene. Furthermore, Nouwen (2007) suggests that such an insertion in the icon is important because 'Pentecost is not the beautiful end of the salvation story, but the beginning of a mission to go out into the world, make disciples of all nations, baptize them ... [and] observe all the commands that Jesus gave us' (Matthew 28:19-20).
