

In a chapter in the book Living the Eucharist, the former Bishop of Salisbury, David Stancliffe (1993-2010) writes that there are two peaks in the Eucharist – the reading of the gospel and the fraction – or the breaking of the bread:

"The second visible peak is the fraction, that utilitarian act by which that whole bread that has been consecrated to be the Body of Christ is broken into pieces so that each person may share in it. But ever since the Emmaus narrative became bedded into the Church's experience, the breaking of the bread has acquired a special significance. That is the moment when memory, sign and present experience were fused in the experience of the disciples, and as Acts (2:46) recalls, it was the by the breaking of the bread in their homes that the early Christians were distinguished."

To underline this significant action, we follow the pattern of using a large bread which breaks into many pieces. It has many qualities – it is large enough to see at a distance – it is 'one' bread underlining we are made one in Jesus the living bread it means that in the breaking – hearing the breaking of the bread – we know that even though broken we are made one in that bread – in him.

We are made one in Christ – in his body that we might be his body in this time and place – that is what we celebrate today. It is what distinguishes us in this day and age as people who are made one rather than being separated over and against one another. Thanks be to God for the Holy Eucharist! God bless you all.

## **GATHERING IN GOD'S NAME**

We stand when the bell is rung.

The liturgy commences with the hymn whilst the priest and liturgical ministers enter.

The altar, which symbolises Christ, is reverenced and censed.

The Entrance Hymn is sung.

- Jesus calls us here to meet him as, through word and song and prayer, we affirm God's promised presence where his people live and care. Praise the God who keeps his promise; praise the Son who calls us friends; praise the Spirit who, among us, to our hopes and fears attends.

  Join the hand of friend and stranger; join the hands of age and youth; join the faithful and the doubter in their common search for truth.
- 4 Jesus calls us to his table rooted firm in time and space, where the church in earth and heaven finds a common meeting place. Share the bread and wine, his body; share the love of which we sing; share the feast of saints and sinners hosted by our Lord and King.

## **HOSPITALITY HELP REQUEST**



# OUR ICON TODAY: Corpus Christi

When we celebrate the Eucharist, the following words are spoken repeatedly. 'The body of Christ, Amen. The blood of Christ, Amen.' These words are like a litany. They give witness to Jesus' complete gift of self to us and for us, but also to the self-surrender to which our Christian living calls us. The Eucharist was a meal that can be seen as an extension of the many meals that Jesus shared with people, the rich and poor, the respected and despised, yet he established communion with them all. The Eucharist today points us to and is a foretaste of the banquet to which we hope to be invited one day in heaven.

The image which is depicted on the cover of today's Mass Booklet illustrates a gathering of the twelve apostles seated in a semi-circle around a table with Jesus as the central figure. This goes back to the Acts of the Apostles where all the apostles are gathered in the one place, and illustrated in today's icon.

The colours associated with the clothing of the apostles unveils a rich tapestry of tradition and spirituality. Jesus is dressed in red, the colour that is so strongly associated with his passion (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982). It also embodies fervent love and selflessness exemplified by Jesus' crucifixion. Jesus occupies the main space in the icon with outstretched arms and uplifted palms.

A symbol of his acceptance of all. Where the iconographer has used the colour white, we know that this is symbolic of divinity and reflects God's presence, and the triumph of light over darkness (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982). Jesus is clothed in a dazzling blue outer robe. Such a colour is associated with heaven and the divine. It also represents transcendence, truth, and the boundless expanse of God's grace.

As is usual in icons and other images of Jesus, the initials IC XC are placed near to him, in this icon above the nimbus that surrounds him at the top of a building in the background. IC XC is the traditional abbreviation of the Greek words for 'Jesus Christ' (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982).

There are four apostles who do not look towards Jesus, perhaps contemplating what may come next, while the others are drawn to what Jesus is saying to them. John leans into the right side of Jesus in a profound gesture of love. This icon could be seen as a simple image, yet it is one that has a deep meaning for the apostles, and of course, for us.

There are no plates or dishes depicted on the table, but a burnished gold chalice now empty that is placed directly in front of Jesus. This is now the focus of the icon. As the viewer, we can see that the meal is finished, so that it could be suggested that Jesus has established communion with all present. A final thought from today's icon could be for our focus to give of ourselves in imitation of Christ as we contemplate a life of freedom and fullness.

At the heart of it all is the eucharistic action, a thing of an absolute simplicity – the taking, blessing, breaking and giving of bread and the taking, blessing, and giving of a cup of wine and water, as these were first done with their new meaning by a young Jew before and after supper with his friends on the night before he died .... So, the four-action shape of the liturgy was found by the end of the first century. He had told his friends to do this henceforward with the new meaning "for the *anamnesis* of him, and they have done it always since.

Saint Bartholomew's Anglican Church was opened on 27 October 1926, the foundation stone having been laid on 25 July. This church replaced the earlier Saint Bartholomew's Churches which were on the corner of Swan and Burnley Streets. There are three buildings on the site; the church, a hall in which the Op Shop runs, with the Guild Hall behind and the vicarage.
