FROM FR STUART:

HONOURED IN THE CHURCH

It is always nice to see people we know being honoured and appreciated for what they have done and who they

are. One of these is Fr Chris Willcock SJ who, together with Dr June Nixon, have been named as new Fellows of the Royal School of Church Music. These two outstanding Australian musicians have made great contributions to church music in our country and beyond and across denominations.

We regularly use Dr Willcock's psalms here and some of his Mass settings. Fr Christopher has given me the honour of composing two pieces for significant events during my ministry. The first of these was a hymn for the consecration of the new Church of the Holy Apostles I built in Sunshine and completed in 2011. A few months later the choir at St Mark's Fitzroy sang a beautiful setting of psalm 63 written by Christopher for my induction there on the Feast of St Mary Magdalene, 2011. Thanks be to God for our musicians who lift our hearts to God in song.

NEW BISHOPS

In recent months three women have been announced as assistant bishops of three dioceses. The Archbishop of Adelaide announced the appointment of the Venerable Sophie Relf-Christopher as an assistant bishop in his diocese. In Brisbane Archbishop Jeremy Greaves, on Friday, ordained the Reverend Sarah Plowman as assistant bishop for the northern region of the diocese. And the Bishop of Canberra-Goulburn has announced the appointment of the Venerable Vanessa Bennett as an assistant bishop in that Diocese. Archdeacon Bennett is currently the Archdeacon of Essendon here in Melbourne. It is wonderful to see these talented women made bishops – the next generation of women's leadership in the Anglican Church of Australia.

Please keep them and all bishops in your prayers.

PARISH COUNCIL AND A PARISH MEETING

Last week the Parish Council carefully considered the issue of the size of the Parish Council.



This discussion arose from the prescribed ten-year review of the changes approved by the parish in 2014 when the new Parish Governance Act was introduced in the Diocese which allowed such changes to be made. You can read Dr Porter's good summation of this matter on page 19 -20.

The process consists of the changes being supported by the parish at a Statutory Meeting of the Parish and then it is sent to the Diocese for approval by the Archbishop in Council before September.

Next month there will be a **Meeting of the Parish on Sunday 28 July** following the Sung Mass on that day to consider the motion put forward by the Parish Council.

PRIDE MONTH AND THE NEED TO PRAY FOR PEACE AND JUSTICE

The other day when I posted a map on Facebook of the way in which Israel has encroached on the Palestinian territories they have illegally occupied since 1967 I received a rather confronting reaction. The gist of it was that the Palestinians wanted me, as a gay Christian, dead and that the only reason I was alive is because they couldn't get to me yet. If I was in Israel, the writer said, my rights would be respected. I was taken aback because it reminded me how sensitive the topic the war in Gaza is for many people. It also was a reminder that some continue to treat LGBTIQ with disdain – both in cruel laws but also in the way people think it is ok to speak to each other.

In this Pride month it was a wakeup call to me that there is much more work to be done and not least within the church as well as in the broader society. There is a meme that states that a Gay Christian is not an oxymoron, but a hateful Christian most certainly is.

On the war in Gaza a friend of mine suggested that we all need to learn more about the history of Palestinian dispossession. This week the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights handed down a report on atrocities committed in this war. Volker Turk said that it was a devastating and reckless war 'on entire communities. All along with hateful, divisive and dehumanising rhetoric.'

Let us all keep praying for peace and justice for all God's people. God bless you all.




FIRST READING

CHURCH LINEN

RSCM HONOURS TWO AUSTRALIAN MUSICIANS

The Royal School of Church Music has honoured two Australian musicians by making them Fellows (FRSCM) for achievements in church music and / or liturgy of internationally recognised significance, or for exceptional musical and/or liturgical work within the RSCM that has had an impact at a national level. Here are the citations announcing the honours. They will be conferred in October.

FR CHRISTOPHER WILLCOCK SJ

Christopher Willcock is a Jesuit priest who has been a regular supporter of RSCM activities across Australia for the last 50 years and an eloquent advocate for the betterment of church music. He has earnt an international reputation as a composer of liturgical music, and his psalm settings and service music are used widely across Australia, the US and the UK.

DR JUNE NIXON

June Nixon has been a special inspiration to women involved in church music, not only through her 40-year tenure as organist of St Paul's Cathedral, Melbourne – one of the first women to be a cathedral organist in the Anglican Communion – but also through her compositions for choir and organ which have earnt her an international reputation. She has also been awarded a Lambeth DMus.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT – JUNE 2024 MODIFYING THE SIZE OF PARISH COUNCIL

The standard Parish Council according to Melbourne Diocese's Parish Governance Act comprises 15 people: three churchwardens, nine parishioners elected at the parish annual meeting, and three parishioners appointed by the Vicar. Under this model, the treasurer is appointed by the churchwardens, and the secretary elected by the council from among its members.

This is a very large group for most parishes. It is difficult to get so many people prepared to undertake this considerable responsibility, and also to undertake the child safety compliance training involved. So, 15 alternative options are provided by the Act. If a parish decides it wants one of these alternatives, its decision must be registered with the Diocese, and renewed every ten years.

Ten years ago, St Bart's decided on the option of three churchwardens (three churchwardens is required in all the options), the parish secretary and treasurer both elected at the annual meeting rather than appointed/elected, and a parishioner appointed by the Vicar. Now the parish has to decide whether to continue with this option, choose one of the other 14 alternatives, or default to the 15-person standard size.

At its June meeting, the Parish Council had a full and careful discussion about whether we wanted to continue with the present model. We considered the range of possible options outlined in the Act, and discussed the pros and cons of the model currently in place. We decided that the current model was a good, workable option for the size of St Bart's congregation, and by allowing the parish to elect the treasurer and secretary directly, it provided transparency and confidence in those elected.

The next step is for the parish to have its input at a statutory meeting, for which at least four weeks' notice must be given.

You will see from the formal notice in the porch that the meeting will be held on Sunday 28 July immediately following the 10am Mass. At that meeting, the Parish Council will propose the following motion:

That the St Bartholomew's Parish Council consist of:

- (b) three churchwardens;
- (c) the treasurer, elected by the annual meeting;
- (d) the parish secretary, elected by the annual meeting; and
- (e) 1 other person nominated by the vicar.



There are three buildings on the site; the church, a hall in which the Op Shop runs, with the Guild Hall behind and the vicarage.
