
THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE COMMUNION



OUR ICON TODAY: The Holy Trinity

The cover of today's Mass booklet shows a copy of an icon originally painted by Andrei Rublev, which has become his most famous work. Rublev, as Russia's most celebrated icon-painter created his exquisite painting for the Trinity Cathedral at the St Sergius monastery in Moscow between 1408 and 1425 (Nouwen 2007: 31; Ouspensky & Lossky 1982: 201). (Note that the colours in today's icon are brighter compared with the original, which are more subdued but the placement of the 'angels' and their gestures, background features and other elements remain identical.)

Rublev's icon takes as its subject the mysterious story where Abraham and his wife Sarah receive three visitors beneath the oak tree of Mamre (also regarded as the tree of life), serves them a meal and who later announces the unexpected birth of a son (Genesis 18). The visitors are depicted as 'angels' and are seated around the table, in the centre of which is a gold bowl symbolising the sacrificial lamb (in the New Testament), that is, Christ. The left angel symbolizes God the Father and blesses the cup with his right hand. The middle angel, representing the Son, points two right-hand fingers to the table thus expressing obedience to the will of the Father. The gesture of the angel on the right, the Holy Spirit, completes the symbolic conversation between the Father and the Son and affirms the meaning of sacrificial love (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982). The Temple can be seen at the top left and a tree in the centre. Less prominent is a rocky hill in the upper right corner. The composition is a semi-circle around the table focusing the viewer's attention on the chalice-bowl in the centre that reminds us of an altar at Communion.

Ouspensky and Lossky (1982) tell us that Rublev gives each person of the Trinity different clothing. On the right, the Holy Spirit is clothed in a garment of mid-sky blue wrapped in a robe of soft green.

As the spirit of creation moves in the sky and water all living things owe their freshness to his touch. The Son has the deepest colours, a thick heavy garment of reddish-brown symbolising the earth and a cloak of heavenly blue. In this way, heaven and earth are united. Rublev has depicted the Father wearing an assortment of colours in a fabric that changes with the light, which appears transparent, but cannot be described in words. Rublev knows this is how it should be. No-one has seen the Father, yet this vision fills the universe.

As we contemplate this icon, we are touched by the spirit who leads us in ways we may not be aware of, up the hill of prayer. It may be steep, but God helps us along the way. This path leads to Christ and, to a tree. A large tree in the heat of the day spreads its shade and is a place of quietness and calm. It stands above the Son and above the altar-table where the lamb lies in the chalice. Because of this sacrifice the tree grows (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982: 200). Thus, it may be concluded that in a symbolic sense, the tree of death has been transformed into a tree of life where we can feel secure and at peace.
