FROM FR STUART:

LIVING EUCHARISTICALLY

As I said last week – these three weeks (commencing last Sunday) we hear passages from the sixth chapter of John's

gospel providing the opportunity for an extended reflection on it. It also provides an opportunity to reflect on the act of worship, which is at the heart of our faith community, which reflects the Christian Church more broadly – the Eucharist.

You will read and hear me say that this is a gift for which we can be grateful. At the heart of gratitude is thanksgiving and that is the core of living eucharistically. Eucharist is a Greek word meaning thanksgiving.

Looking for signs of hope in the church and society at large is one way of living eucharistically. To see right, one might say, seeking to see how God sees with all the humility we can bring to this. It means being open to God's transformative Spirit in Christ. Life is full of anniversaries which mark out our lives – personally and as a church. Tuesday is the Feast of the Transfiguration. It marks the transfiguration of the Lord on the mount, witnessed by Peter, James and John. However, August 6th also marks another significant event – luminous and destructive – the dropping of the first atomic bomb on the Japanese city of Hiroshima in 1945. Striving to end the proliferation of nuclear weapons with their destructive power has eluded many and remain a threat. That task requires transformation of many thoughts and ways of seeing – to a much more eucharistic way of seeing the world and each other. Janet Morley has written this lovely prayer for that feast and picks up some of these themes:

Christ, our only true light, before whose bright cloud your friends fell to the ground: we bow before your cross that we may remember in our bodies the dead who fell like shadows; and that we may refuse to be prostrated before the false brightness of any other light, looking to your power alone for hope of resurrection from the dead, Amen.



A Prayer to Use Before Mass Starts

RICHMOND FOOD CENTRE DONATION IDEAS


On Monday, Jillian took our offerings of foodstuffs to the Richmond Churches Food Centre. There is a great need for these items at present:

WORK IN PROGRESS

I am a work-in-progress, and there's plenty of work to be done. But God is at work, going back in our past, redeeming what was lost, spent, and misdirected. Father Benson speaks comforting words, that "we cannot bound into the depths of God at one spring; if we could, we should be shattered, not filled. God draws us on." Br. Curtis Almquist, SSJE

THE WONDER OF THE EUCHARIST

At the heart of it all is the Eucharistic action, a thing of an absolute simplicity – they taking, blessing, breaking and giving of bread and the taking, blessing and giving of a cup of wine and water, as these were first done with their new meaning by a young Jew before and after supper with his friends on the night before he died. Soon it was simplified still further, by leaving out the supper and combining the double grouping before and after it into a single rite. So the four-action shape of the liturgy was found by the end of the first century. He had told his friends to do this henceforward with the new meaning "for the *anamnesis*" of him, and they have done it always since.

Was ever another command so obeyed? For century after century, spreading slowly to every continent and country and among every race on earth, this action has been done, in every conceivable human circumstance, for every conceivable human need from infancy and before it to extreme old age and after it, from the pinnacles of earthly greatness to the refuge of fugitives in the caves and dens of the earth. We have found no better thing than this to do for kins at their crowning and for criminals going to the scaffold; for armies in triumph or for a bride and bridegroom in a little country church; for the proclamation of a dogma or for a good crop of wheat; for the wisdom of the Parliament of a mighty nation or for a sick old woman afraid to die; for a schoolboy sitting an examination or for Columbus setting out to discover America; for the famine of whole provinces or for the soul of a dead lover; in thankfulness because my father did not die of pneumonia, for a village headman much tempted to return to fetish because the yams have failed; because the Turk was at the gates of Vienna; for the repentance of Margaret; for the settlement of a strike; for a son for a barren woman; for Captain so-andso, wounded and prisoner of war; while lions roared in the nearby amphitheatre; on the breach at Dunkirk; while the hiss of the scythes in the thick June grass came faintly through the windows of the church; tremulously, by an old monk on the fiftieth anniversary of his vows;

furtively by an exiled bishop who had hewn timber all day in a prison camp near Murmansk; gorgeously, for the canonisation of St Joan of Arc – one could fill many pages with the reasons why we have done this, and not tell a hundredth part of them. And best of all, week by week and month by month, on a hundred thousand successive Sundays, faithfully, unfailingly, across all the parishes of Christendom, the pastors have done this just to *make* the *plebs sancta Dei* – the holy common people of God.

To those who know a little of Christian history probably the most moving of all the reflections it brings is not the thought of the great events and the well-remembered saints, but of those innumerable millions of entirely obscure faithful men and women, everyone with his or her own individual hopes and fears and joys and sorrows and loves – and sins and temptations and prayers – once every whit as vivid and alive as mine and now. They have left no slightest trace in this world, not even a name, but have passed to God utterly forgotten by us. Yet each of them once believed and prayed as I believe and pray, and found it hard and grew slack and sinned and repented and fell again. Each of them worshiped at the Eucharist, and round their thoughts wandering and tried again, and felt heavy and unresponsive and yet knew – just a really and pathetically as I do these things. There is a little ill-spelled, ill-carved rustic epitaph of the fourth century from Asia Minor: "Here sleeps the blessed Chione, who has found Jerusalem for she prayed much." Not another word is know of Chione, some peasant woman who lived in that vanished world of Christian Anatolia. But how lovely if all that should survive after sixteen centuries were that one had prayer much, so that the neighbours who saw all one's life were sure one must have found Jerusalem! What did the Sunday eucharist in her village church every week for a lifetime mean to the blessed Chione – and to the millions like her then, and every year since? The sheer stupendous quantity of the love of God which this everrepeated action has drawn from the obscure Christian multitude through the centuries is in itself an overwhelming thought.



HISTORY

Saint Bartholomew's Anglican Church was opened on 27 October 1926, the foundation stone having been laid on 25 July. This church replaced the earlier Saint Bartholomew's Churches which were on the corner of Swan and Burnley Streets. There are three buildings on the site; the church, a hall in which the Op Shop runs, with the Guild Hall behind and the vicarage.
