

AN INSPIRING START TO THE SEASON OF CREATION

It was good to welcome Fr Andrew Eaton to our Sunday celebration of the Eucharist last week! We had been on



retreat in the week prior. In his homily he drew connections between the readings for the day and the theme over these next six weeks – the Season of Creation.

As you know from my previous introductions in church and letters Fr Andrew completed two years of supervised field education with me in the Parish of Sunshine. They were the years I was working with the parish to plan for a new church and community centre which connected us more visibly and clearly with the local community.

I also officiated at the marriage of Fr Andrew and his wife, Monica and am the proud god father of their two girls.

Fr Andrew, hailing from the biggest coal port in Australia, Newcastle, inspired with the very practical and concrete initiatives that he was part of in that Diocese of some successful moves towards divestment of the Diocese from the fossil fuel industry. But it was the message to our hearts to ensure that we dissociate ourselves from that which pollutes and comes from within and results in division and rivalry. The gospel points us clearly in this direction. When we marry this movement in our souls with climate action we will, I am sure, be more effective in both living the gospel and helping change the world.

Today, it is very good to welcome Fr Russell Goulbourne as our guest presider and homilist. Fr Russell also completed two years on field education with me, but at Saint Mark's Fitzroy. He is a fine academic, insightful preacher, as you know, and has a heart for God and the gospel.



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD


FIRST READING

THE CREED

We stand for the creed which is said by all.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary,] all may and became truly human.] bow For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.



The priest recites the prayer over the gifts and we respond:




The Prayer continues to the Sanctus and Benedictus is sung by all to the setting below.







TODAY'S ICON

In Eastern Orthodoxy this festival is known as the *Nativity of the Theotokos,* Theotokos meaning 'God-bearer'

In the festival of the birth of the Mother of God, the church celebrates the human birth whose 'fruit most pure' was sanctified from the moment of conception. While the conception of John the Baptist, equally an important festival in the church, is given a detailed account in the Gospels, the latter say nothing of the birth of the Mother of God.

On the other hand, Apocryphal sources do give a substantial share to the origin and childhood of Mary. (The Apocrypha is a collection of books written in the four centuries between the Old and New Testaments) Also, there is a work of Judeo-Christian origin concerning Mary that dates to 130-140 C.E. (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982). This source provides certain particulars about the family of the Mother of God: the name of her parents, Joachim and Anna, and the descent of Joachim from David. More recently further details have emerged. Some writers give Nazareth, the homeland of Joachim, as Mary's birthplace, others suggest Bethlehem, the birthplace of Anna, others again Jerusalem. (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982). However, wherever her actual birthplace may be, we acknowledge that today, Sunday 8th September, is the day when we celebrate the birth of the Virgin Mary.

This special day celebrating Mary's birth is very ancient: it is known that Justinian erected a church in Constantinople dedicated to St Anna, the mother of Mary (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982). Justinian served as a Christian Roman emperor of the Byzantine empire from 527 to 565 C.E. and built Hagia Sophia along with other important churches in Constantinople (Cormack 1985).

In the image reproduced on the cover of today's Mass Booklet, we see Mary's father Joachim looking on as her mother Anna rests on a bed surrounded by servants preparing to bathe the newly born infant. The figures of Joachim and Anna are placed in such a way that emphasize their majestic character. Anna accepts refreshments from her handmaids after the birth. A seated midwife holds her daughter. The midwife and the other servants play the part of accessories: attention is focused on the parents and their child.


We can see that Mary appears again in the lower right-hand corner of the icon, resting in her cradle. This is a traditional device in Byzantine iconography where the same person can be shown more than once in the same icon scene (Cormack (1985).

As both Orthodox and Western Christians throughout the world remember this festival in their calendar, we too may give a little time to reflect and contemplate today's icon of the birth of the Mother of God whose son was to bring tidings of immense joy to the whole universe.



HISTORY

Saint Bartholomew's Anglican Church was opened on 27 October 1926, the foundation stone having been laid on 25 July. This church replaced the earlier Saint Bartholomew's Churches which were on the corner of Swan and Burnley Streets. There are three buildings on the site; the church, a hall in which the Op Shop runs, with the Guild Hall behind and the vicarage.
