FROM FR STUART:

THE FAITH MAKES US KIND AND HOPEFUL

It was lovely to welcome Fr Russell Goulbourne to St Bart's last Sunday to preside and preach as we celebrated the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

> Such an observance – which we don't usually have year by year on a Sunday – allows us to reflect on the groundedness of our faith and the story of salvation in a deep relationality between God and humanity. It takes singular form in Mary's 'Yes'. She is God's mum, yes, but she was also born and lived a full human life.

Fr Russell opened great riches of these mysteries to us in his homily.

OTHER JOYS LAST SUNDAY

After Mass and morning tea last Sunday I was delighted and privileged to bless the home of Mehran Roozbahani. He invited me and Craig to join him for this special blessing. One of the joys of being a parish priest, for me at least, is to be asked to do this. Mehran has a lovely place to live and he is putting his mark on it beautifully. We prayed for God's loving protection and grace to fill that house for him.

Then, I was asked to preach at Trinity College for Evensong. It was for the Birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It was a marvellous evening. The seminarians from Trinity and the Corpus Christi Seminary were present for Evensong and then a meal afterwards. This is a long-standing custom between Trinity and Corpus Christi. I remember these occasions when I was at Trinity 30 years ago.




FIRST READING



He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. Saint Bartholomew's Anglican Church was opened on 27 October 1926, the foundation stone having been laid on 25 July. This church replaced the earlier Saint Bartholomew's Churches which were on the corner of Swan and Burnley Streets. There are three buildings on the site; the church, a hall in which the Op Shop runs, with the Guild Hall behind and the vicarage.
