FROM FR STUART:

THE GREAT 100 DAYS

Today marks the beginning of the great 100 days of the Christian Year. If you count the days from today, the

Sunday before Lent, through to Pentecost Sunday, the Eighth Sunday of Easter, you mark out 100 days. Looking at it this way holds together two great seasons of the church's year – Lent and Easter. The church's year holds us in this embrace of the deep dynamic of the spiritual life – the call to 'return to the Lord' which is what 'repentance' means – and living in the joy of God's unending love which is what it means to be God's resurrection people.

Learning this is a lifelong experience and the church invites us to embark on that inward journey once more. I look forward to this journey with you. The journey from the mountain top down into the reality of life with its attendant joys, challenges and sometimes eviscerating experiences to a place of renewal and renewed commitment in the life of the Risen One.

So, join us! It begins today and the first big moment is this coming Wednesday.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Mass will be offered on Wednesday at 10.00 am and 6.30 pm. These will be simple said Masses at which the ancient custom of the imposition of ashes will take place. I will talk about this on Wednesday but one way to look at it is that it grounds us in the earthiness of our reality as human beings – flawed and full of potential as we are – and open us to God's grace for transformation.

READING CIRCLE

On some Wednesday evenings in Lent, we will use the book *Many Paths Lead to Easter* by Jesuit theologian Andy Hamilton. It allows us to ponder the Sunday readings more deeply as we travel through Lent. We will meet weekly from 26 March and the book costs \$10. Please let me know if you would like to join us.

THE LITURGICAL SPACE

As is the custom of the parish during Lent and Easter, we will reorient the liturgical space into a monastic or collegiate arrangement.



This will consist of the pews facing inwards across the centre of the nave, the ambo being in the midst of the people and the presider's chair opposite the ambo. The other axis will be the font and the altar which are the key foci of the Church's sacramental life, and which have added import during these 100 days. If you can help our sacristan Jonathon and I set this up after Mass today, please let us know.

PEOPLE AND GIFTS AND SKILLS – SAYING HELLO AND GOODBYE

I have just had news that dear friends are about to arrive to visit during Lent. They live in the United States and one of them lived for many years in Australia before returning to live there in 2018.

It reminded me of one of the challenging things in life and the in the life of a faith community. People come and go all the time. New people come into our lives and the life of our community, and we farewell old friends all the time.

I must admit that I find saying goodbye to people difficult, but it is part of life. We know that over the past few months some have left our community and forged new commitments in other communities of faith. Others have joined us over the past two, three years or more recently. The life of exploring and deepening our life in God never ends and we are being enriched by each other in the process. We must always remain open to these graces and the whimsy of comings and goings.

We know that there are many reasons why people choose to leave. Sometimes it is work or family circumstances, or the desire to find a new place to explore the faith or life's many opportunities. Difficult and sad though it is – we are called to give thanks for what has been and farewell those who leave with good grace and wish them God's speed and aid in their journeys. This is always important because our paths often cross once more and bonds of affection never fray.

One tremendously valuable new arrival in our parish's life is our new Manager of the Op Shop, Adrian Evans. Since he commenced in January business has thrived. Adrian has brought great energy and a joyful and passionate personal touch to this outreach of the parish. With many decades of experience in retail, we are lucky to have him. GATHERING IN GOD'S NAME

THE ABSOLUTION

The priest pronounces the absolution.

THE GLORIA

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

THE OPENING PRAYER

The priest sings the opening prayer, and we respond: **Amen.**

We sit for the readings.

The cantor sings the psalm, and the congregation repeats the response and then joins in the response throughout the psalm.

THE CREED

While the gifts of bread and wine are brought to the sanctuary and the altar is prepared. The altar and the priest are censed. The thurifer comes into the nave to cense the whole assembly

PRAYER OVER THE GIFTS

The priest recites the prayer over the gifts and we respond:

Amen.

O God, who in this wonderful Sacrament have left us a memorial of your Passion, grant us, we pray, so to revere the sacred mysteries of your Body and Blood that we may always experience in ourselves the fruits of your redemption, who live and reign with the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

We stand throughout the prayer.

The Lord be with you. and also with you. Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord. Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The prayer continues

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.


SAINT BART'S BOOK CLUB

The committee of <u>Victorian Anglicans Together</u> is delighted to invite all who are interested to attend the first of VAT's series of meetings and seminars leading up to the election of our new Archbishop, an event which will be of great importance for the future of our Diocese, and indeed for the Anglican Church of Australia more broadly. On **Thursday 6 March at 7pm** Bishop Alison Taylor will speak to us about the nature of episcopacy, in the church hall at St Peter's Eastern Hill.

Bishop Alison will speak about the role of bishop, its historical development, the particulars of Anglican episcopacy, and the tasks of a bishop. She will also explore how these insights might inform our discernment process for the election of our next Archbishop of Melbourne.



The Right Revd Dr Alison Taylor AM is assisting the Marmingatha Episcopate in Melbourne while Bishop Genieve Blackwell serves as Administrator for the Diocese. Originally from Melbourne, Bishop Alison was the first woman consecrated as a bishop in Queensland, leading the Southern Region of the Diocese of Brisbane.

Since returning to Melbourne, she has been awarded a PhD from Deakin University for her research into the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. Her thesis was entitled "Problematising Anglican Episcopal Authority: The Contribution of a Royal Commission".


